Lowe's builds hope for the dreams of children and families.

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From a disbanded church to a home for volunteers, Dunbarton Cottage continues to make an impact. Built from the funds of a disbanded church in the 1950s, Dunbarton Cottage's rich history continues to impact children's dreams with new renovations from Lowe's Home Improvement.

In June, Lowe's announced that Connie Maxwell Children's Ministries (CMCM) renovation of the Dunbarton Cottage was one of 100 community projects to be completed this year as part of Lowe's Hometowns, the company's largest-ever community impact program.

CMCM used the \$110,000 grant to renovate the interior and exterior of Dunbarton Cottage. On Oct. 24 and 25, Lowe's hosted a "Red Vest Day," where associates from Lowe's from Greenwood and surrounding areas volunteered to help finish the final renovations of the cottage.

Dunbarton Cottage, completed in 1953, was originally an infirmary. The building was a gift from the members of Dunbarton Church, which had to disband in 1952 after the Federal Atomic Energy Commission selected the site of the town of Dunbarton and the adjoining area for the location of a Defense Plant.

The church's members voted to take the proceeds from the sale of their church, totaling \$52,750, and use the funds to build Dunbarton

Memorial Infirmary. The funds from the sale were presented to CMCM on March 23, 1952.

Guests can see Dunbarton Church memorabilia at the cottage, including an original plaque and communion chalices. While Dunbarton Church has disbanded, its members' gift continues to impact Connie Maxwell children and their dreams for the future.

Dunbarton Cottage is now a 13-bed, 9-bath guest home that will house volunteers. With over 2,000 volunteers visiting campus each year to work on significant projects that will impact generations of children and families, it is important to provide accommodations to those serving.

Danny Nicholson, President of CMCM, said, "We are very thankful for this grant from Lowe's Hometowns Community Impact Project. This grant will allow us to complete the Dunbarton Home and allow us to have more volunteers visit campus. Volunteers are vital to our mission to complete our plans that are part of our Decade

of Dreams strategic plan. We are thrilled to have been chosen and know this will help us continue to care for more children and families for years to come."

Along with red vest associates from Lowe's, members of Carolinas Cornerstone Church from Fort Mill, S.C., also worked to help in renovations. Around 15 volunteers from the church worked to update the cottage before the Lowe's Red Vest Day.

Launched in 2022, Lowe's Hometowns is a five-year, \$100 million commitment from Lowe's to rebuild and revitalize community spaces nationwide. Each project receives a grant from Lowe's to make physical improvements that help local organizations continue to make a meaningful impact in their communities.





Bob Martin, Store Director at Lowe's in Greenwood, shared, "What an honor it is to work for an organization like Lowe's that gives back to the community in many ways. Our connection with the team of professionals at Connie Maxwell has been enlightening and rewarding. The support and partnership we have created on this project reminds us of the good in people."

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On July 30, 2023, Pastor Ed Gidewall preached his first sermon as the new Senior Pastor at Connie Maxwell Baptist Church.

Gidewall comes to Connie Maxwell with a Bachelor of Arts in Christian Studies from North Greenville University and a Master in Divinity from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Originally from Travelers Rest, S.C., he began his first role as Interim Minister to Students at First Baptist Church Travelers Rest, where he was ordained.

He has served as Minister to Students at Harris Baptist Church and Interim Senior Pastor at Emerald Baptist Church in Greenwood. Prior to coming to Connie Maxwell, he served as the pastor for high school, college and young adults at Second Baptist Church in Lancaster, S.C.

Before Gidewall answered God's call to lead Connie Maxwell Baptist Church, he answered a call from Scott Smith, the Baptist Collegiate Ministry Director at Lander University. Seven words from that conversation stuck with him: "Connie Maxwell is looking for a pastor."

After praying with his wife, Jessica, about the new ministry opportunity, he and his wife began the official interview process.

Gidewall was no stranger to those at Connie Maxwell Children's Ministries (CMCM). Tanner Eklund, Director of Enrichment at CMCM, is a former member of Gidewall's youth group. Alex Morrison, Associate Pastor at Connie Maxwell Baptist Church, first met Gidewall at Baptist Collegiate Ministry at Lander University. Both encouraged him to consider the role of Senior Pastor.

Gidewall and his wife of 14 years, Jessica, along with their two children, Sam and Emily, have transitioned well into life at Connie Maxwell. Sam and Emily have especially enjoyed spending time at the pool and gym and visiting Wiggles the pig at Maxwell Farms.

Gidewall stated, "Even over these first few months, God has made it evident as to why we are here. We have had the joy to witness five students make public professions of faith through baptism. We have five more students and a family care mom scheduled in the next month. God has been working on our campus, and we now get to see the results! I get the opportunity to hang out with students, cottage parents and staff every single day. I have already experienced incredible ministry moments in our short time here."

Gidewall's philosophy in ministry is "to see people know Jesus in a real way, grow in their love and knowledge of Him and see them go into the world and share His love by meeting the physical and spiritual needs of others."

We are grateful for Pastor Ed as he leads Connie Maxwell Baptist Church and lays the biblical foundation for Connie Maxwell children to dream big.





The mission of Connie Maxwell Children's Ministries (CMCM) is to restore the faith, family and future of our children and families, and the brightest future they can have is one with Jesus at the center of their lives. The children who come to Connie Maxwell are in the midst of the most painful and confusing times of their lives through no fault of their own. Out of that comes a lack of hope, trust and faith. During the summer, eight CMCM children and one mom in the Family Care program surrendered their lives to Christ and were baptized.

Ed Gidewall, Senior Pastor at Connie Maxwell Baptist Church (CMBC), shared, "God is at work, not just in the children of Connie Maxwell, but all over campus."

OUR VILLAGE

As the saying goes, it takes a village to raise a child. Throughout the year, children are poured into by their cottage parents, relationships with staff members, cottage conversations created by Gidewall and time spent at multiple church service opportunities at CMBC.

Stacy Higginbotham, a cottage parent to elementary school boys, was there when two boys decided to follow Jesus.

Higginbotham shared about Aaron's transformation after coming to know Jesus and how grateful she was to be part of it. "Anything he could learn, he wanted to learn. You could tell he was hungry for it and wanted to understand more. And then you could see a change in his personality and outward actions. You don't always get to see the fruits of your labor. You pour into children, plant those seeds, and sometimes you never get to watch it grow. You continue to water it. But it was exciting to be able to be part of that with him and to be able to share with everyone else about what happened."

After the boys committed to follow Jesus, Alex Morrison, Associate Pastor of Worship and Discipleship at CMBC, met individually to answer questions and discuss the next step of professing their faith through baptism.

"After our students make a profession of faith and get baptized, we've begun a process of discipleship with them. We meet with the kids weekly for eight weeks, going through some major topics. We do this hoping they can grow in their faith, not just while on campus, but as they leave here one day," Morrison shared.

Connie Maxwell Baptist Church serves as both the CMCM campus and community church. Children at the Greenwood campus attend the church, where they interact weekly with Sunday school teachers, pastors, cottage parents and CMCM staff. pel to the kids at Connie Maxwell. "We teach the kids that there is a Creator who loves them dearly. He has made them, and He has a purpose for their lives. There are many things out of their control that have happened to them. Connie Maxwell is a place where they can come and understand who God is, who they are and how they fit into His purpose," said Gidewall.

On Sunday evenings, the children participate in cottage conversations with their cottages. These conversations discuss what they learned that morning at church, allowing students to engage with the message.

"Through the cottage conversations, our cottage parents have been able to further disciple. They've been able to talk to them about the things of God, and some of them have even had the opportunity to lead the students to Jesus," Gidewall shared.

Gidewall is passionate about teaching the gos-

HEALING THROUGH FITNESS MAXFIT GYM RENOVATIONS ALLOW MORE ROOM TO SERVE STUDENTS.

At Connie Maxwell Children's Ministries (CMCM), we offer our children a holistic approach to healing from trauma. One way we do this is through the MaxFit Health and Wellness program led by Lauren Boyd, an ACSM-certified personal trainer.

Before arriving at Connie Maxwell, Boyd managed a High-Intensity Interval Training (HIIT) gym in Alabama for three years. Her love for athletics and sports began during her college years at Samford University and eventually led her to a career in fitness.

She now uses fitness to minister to children and staff at Connie Maxwell.

"The research is there. Studies have proven that children who experience trauma have better outcomes when they're eating healthy, consistently exercising and spending time outdoors," stated Boyd.

Part of the healing initiative of President Danny Nicholson's 10-year plan, A Decade of Dreams, is to be a national leader in healing and ministry to children that have been exposed to trauma. Based on research, gym renovation and emphasis on wellness is an outflow of that initiative.

Boyd's goal through MaxFit is to encourage healthy lifestyles among the staff and students — a place where everyone can encourage each other to live their best lives mentally, emotionally, spiritually and physically.

With the new gym renovation, Boyd will conduct optional HIIT fitness classes for kids with trauma-centered sensory equipment. These exercises will help Connie Maxwell kids release their stress and negative emotions in a healthy way. Boyd will also work with our student-athletes, offering training sessions focused on balance, agility and strength to increase their athletic performance.

Boyd currently conducts HIIT classes for staff members on campus. These sessions are a fitness regime to alleviate stress and cope with anxiety and daily emotional strains. Her philosophy goes beyond just physical exercise. Through these wellness initiatives, she strives to create a supportive community among students and staff.

Brad Seztler, Vice President for Human Resources, expressed his excitement for the increased emphasis on health and fitness that Boyd is leading. "Our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, and God commands us to take care of it. When our staff feel good (spiritually, mentally and physically), they can better serve our children; the children get their best! When our children feel good, they better navigate the trauma they have been through, thereby enhancing their ability to heal!"

The gym, previously a compact 400-squarefoot space, has recently been expanded to 1,500 square feet, allowing additional space to serve more students.

The gym renovations at CMCM have not been a solo effort but a testament to the strength of the community. Dedicated volunteers, led by David Burress and Brian Ray from First Baptist Church Simpsonville, put in over 15 hours of hard work to tear down walls, install drywall, paint and lay 3,500 pounds of rubber flooring. Brad Harvey from Upstate Flooring Customs also played a pivotal role by generously providing the flooring as a gift to CMCM.

In addition, a significant boost came from the Duke Energy Foundation, which awarded a \$4,000 grant to CMCM to enhance the health and wellness efforts started by Boyd. This grant will purchase essential equipment like rowers and push sleds. Vilette Uhl, a CMCM cottage parent for the past two years, has been an integral part of the gym renovation project. Uhl volunteered her artistic talents for the new renovation and designed two gym walls — a mural of the MaxFit logo and a mural of silhouettes depicting specific children and adults from Connie Maxwell. The children can see themselves on the wall when working with Boyd in the gym.

Uhl said, "I wanted everyone to be able to see themselves or something they enjoy in at least one of the silhouettes. The theme is Lauren's vision — that a healthy lifestyle isn't just exercising. It is also spending time with God, making time to worship, what you eat, that you enjoy nature, that you do activities and sports you enjoy and that you find beauty in all of God's creation."

Underneath the silhouettes is Hebrews 12:1-2, which says, "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God."

Through the new MaxFit gym, Connie Maxwell children will meet their health, wellness, faith and personal growth goals, equipping them with all they need to chase their dreams and achieve bright futures.

Nearly 250 people – CMCM foster families, families licensed with other agencies, volunteers and staff – attended the events. The nights involved training, encouragement, childcare, food, fellowship, games and door prizes, including a two-night all-inclusive stay at the Grove Park Inn in Asheville, N.C., for two Connie Maxwell foster families. These giveaways were donated by the South Carolina Baptist Convention (SCBC). Connie Maxwell aims to partner with local churches to help care for families in the trenches of foster care. Jay Boyd sees the THRIVE events as part of a bigger vision that will grow in the years ahead. "Of course, we want to see the number of fosters families increase, but we also know how important it is to help our current families feel equipped and supported in their journey."

Paula Reed, Director of Foster Care, was thrilled with the response from our foster families and other fostering families in our community. "This is just one of the ways we love to celebrate the people who pour so much of themselves into the lives of children in need of a safe, stable and Christian family environment, " shared Reed.

Dunn is a Michigan-born and bred lover of Jesus, wife, mother and therapist. She has worked in the child welfare system for





twenty years and is a sought-after conference speaker on related issues. Her goal is to help eradicate the idea of "unadoptable" and "aging out." In 2012, Dunn and her husband, Jason, founded House of Providence, a therapeutic residential facility for older foster youth languishing with little or no prospect for permanency. Together with their two biological children, they added six children from foster care to their family over the years.

One of the attendees, Margie Fotinos expressed her gratitude for the foster care event. "Maggie was helpful with teaching how a child must process their trauma and how to help them go through the process as a parent. The more information we can hear on trauma-informed parenting, the better we can help our foster children in our care."
